

MEET THE MAYOR, WAYNE THORLEY

As I step into the role of Mayor following the recent Local Government elections, I would like to take this opportunity to thank the **Rural City of Murray Bridge community for** putting their trust in me to lead Council over the next four years.

It's a challenging start for myself – and our new and returning Elected Members – with the Murray River flooding expected to exceed 1974 levels. I have been heartened to see the way emergency services, government agencies, Council and community groups are working together to prepare our district for this event.

The flood situation will be the primary focus for Council over coming months as we get ready for the river level to peak in December, and the clean-up and recovery efforts in its wake once the waters recede.

Our focus will be on continuing to work closely with lead agencies managing the flood response and ensuring our residents, businesses and farmers are getting the information they need to inform their decisions over coming weeks.

I'll be drawing on my experiences managing and responding to emergency situations through my previous roles with the SA CFS and as a former SAFECOM board member to ensure the right messages are getting out to our community.


As a farmer based in Jervois – and with some of my own property at risk from the floodwaters – I understand the concern and uncertainty many in our community may be facing. While a flood of this magnitude hasn't been seen in decades, I can recall the 1974 event and the way the people of our district banded together to support each other. I'm hopeful that with the advance warning we currently have, with our emergency and government services collaborating and with our community spirit we will be well placed to make it through this event together.



While the flood response will be our top priority, Council will also be focused on progressing the strategic vision for our district and, in the new year, will begin preparing for our first Annual Business Plan as a new team. This is a critical time in which we will determine the Council projects, programs and initiatives to serve and benefit our

Murray Bridge and its surrounds have been well served over the past term by passionate and community minded Elected Members, and I look forward to seeing this continue with the support of the new Council and our knowledgeable and committed staff.

MEET YOUR COUNCILLORS



Cr Andrew Baltensperger

A small business owner who has lived in Murray Bridge since 1978, Andrew has served as a Councillor for eight years. He is community minded, approachable, results driven, passionate and tenacious. He also served on the local health board, which oversees hospital and community health in the Murray Bridge area. Fred lives in Murray Bridge with his wife Barbara and has an adult daughter. He looks forward to continuing serve the communities of Murray Bridge and outlying areas, with energy, vision, and passion.

Cr Mat O'Brien

Mat is focused on core council business and getting the basics right. Roads, rates and rubbish are a priority, as well as expanding the footpath network and ensuring well-lit and safe public spaces. Mat also wants to see the Rural City of Murray Bridge capitalise on funding opportunities to progress important community infrastructure, like the Regional Sports Stadium. He will advocate for rates to be as low as possible and understands the financial stress that many in the community are feeling as a result of cost-of-living pressures. He would like to see more access to the riverfront for residents, rejecting development that infringes upon community use. Mat remains committed to further assisting residents with issues that impact them and has been a keen supporter of local jobs and business. Mat believes Council must focus on delivering for all within its boundaries. Over the last term, he was proud to support the campaign to save the Overland rail service, the only passenger train to come through our town.

Cr Airlie Keen

Airlie is an experienced Councillor who has been a determined advocate for keeping rates in check, whilst balancing the need to deliver services and infrastructure, including improved roads, footpaths, playgrounds, public toilets and upgrades at Sturt and other river reserves. Airlie has persistently argued that as valuations rise, the rate in the dollar must fall and she fought hard to reduce rate caps. Airlie supports the region's transformation to boost residential growth and tourism and to support local businesses and employment. Supporting new and enhanced sporting and recreational facilities is a priority, along with trails and the environment, youth opportunities and community events. Focus areas include safer roads and better transport options and planning laws that support growth. Airlie has been re-elected to Council's Strategic Planning and development Policy Committee and will also serve as a member of the Murray Darling Association's Region 6. Airlie supported the Callington Community Centre, Regional Study Hub, Lerwin's expansion and the new regional stadium. Airlie believes Council should be transparent, accountable, and financially sustainable and will continue to work towards that end.

Cr John DeMichele

John has grown up and lived in Murray Bridge his entire life and believes the region has lots of potential – he says we've only just began to scratch the surface. John plans to continue his time as Councillor with a focus on tourism, creating local jobs and advocating for small business. John sits on the Strategic Planning and Development Policy Committee. THE MAKING OF MAKE IT YOURS



A breathtaking documentary series focusing on Murray Bridge's complex history is set to grace our screens.

And who better to tell this story, than Maryanne Demasi – an experienced TV presenter and storyteller. Based in Sydney for the past 17 years, Maryanne is a South Aussie at heart and still calls Adelaide 'home'.

Maryanne brings an intense curiosity to her research, tackling tough stories and continues to work as an investigative journalist and international speaker. She has appeared on Channel 7 and the ABC's Catalyst program for many years and holds a doctorate in medical research.

In preparation for this series, Maryanne spoke with a range of Murray Bridge locals; business owners, teachers, artists, and migrants to name a few.

In the first episode, Maryanne speaks with former Mayor Brenton Lewis, who beams with pride as he talks about the achievements during his time in office. He has lived in Murray Bridge since he was a boy and the locals will tell you that his commitment to the region is beyond reproach.

Maryanne explores the rich history of the town with local historian Ken Wells, who takes her through the museum's archives, revealing some never-before-seen photos of the early days.

Wendy Gaborit, a long-time local working for Housing SA, takes Maryanne on a drive through the streets of Murray Bridge, pointing out areas of growth as well as hardship. Wendy has volunteered in the community for more than 30 years, most notably with Rotary, and was awarded an OAM for her service to the community.

Of course, what would the documentary be without the presence of Ngarrindjeri artist and comedian Kevin Kropinyeri? Having lived away for 16 years he was amazed by the changes upon his return and has been commissioned by the Council to create public artwork which can be seen dotted around the city.
