MOST people are familiar with early starts on chilly Saturday mornings, rugged up with a hot drink after travelling to one of our local sporting grounds to watch a game and cheer on their chosen player.

The days are getting shorter, the weather is cooling and as netball, football and soccer seasons kick into gear this month there can be no doubt that in the Murraylands we love our sport.

For those not so keen on the early morning starts however, River Murray Football League matches will be live streamed this year allowing more sporting enthusiasts to remotely follow the competition and their favourite teams.

To support a significant investment in this initiative local businesses will be given the opportunity to advertise and sponsor the league.

Sport is vital in rural communities like ours because it brings the community together, promotes social interaction and inclusion and contributes positively to community identity and a sense of place.

Sport provides opportunities for physical activity and improved health outcomes.

Regional centres like ours produce a high number of Australia's most successful athletes.

Local sporting greats in the headlines this year for their stand out achievements include: Alex Bolt in the Australian Open, Ally Wilson in the Australian Women's Opals Basketball Squad, Sports Person of the Year Mark Smyth for darts and our Young Sports Person of the Year Molly Bretag for clay target shooting representation at a National and International level.

We have a proud history of sporting culture and community in the Murraylands, and Council supports the benefits through the provision and maintenance of sporting facilities and grants.

We are fortunate to host the Murraylands STARclub officer, Marc Maddaford, here in Murray Bridge.

More than 120 Murraylands clubs are now involved in this award winning program which helps sporting clubs become sustainable, vibrant and inclusive.

Interestingly 85% of sporting grants being awarded go to clubs involved with STARclub.

Grants of up to \$100 are available to help young people attend State sporting commitments.

Bi annual funding rounds of up to \$3,100 per applicant are available to support local projects and events with a focus on the development of local communities through Council's Community Events Grants and Donations Program.

Council's Sport and Recreation team is working strategically with local clubs to review their grounds, infrastructure and masterplans, with a view to understanding clubs' future aspirations and how Council could work with them to achieve their goals. Specifically this year, Johnstone Park, LeMessurier Oval, Christian Reserve and Jaensch/Homburg Oval are in focus.

Hosting significant sporting events creates economic stimulus and raises the community profile.

Major sporting events coming up include the MX Nationals and Australian Karting Championships in May – and don't forget about ongoing Murray Bridge Speedway races.

CONNECTED Communities need great outdoor spaces to thrive.

The Rural City of Murray Bridge has invested significantly in planning for attractive, accessible and relevant open spaces to keep pace with an actively growing community.

Council is keenly aware of the importance and impact our open spaces and environment have on quality of life for residents, wildlife, future generations and town pride.

Local children and their parents are making the most of the recently upgraded McNamara Park on McHenry Street after a recent makeover included the installation of a new playground, landscaping and irrigation.

Sheltered picnic settings have been installed at Murrundi Reserve at Wellington, Geisler Reserve at Jervois and Woodlane Reserve at Mypolonga.

Residents can look forward to a new playground at Christian Reserve this year, along with mass plantings to improve the landscape, a new trail path, improved drainage, upgraded parking and toilets.

Future aspirations for the park include new clubrooms and an upgraded PA and lighting system, along with nature play nodes and an additional informal overspill parking area.

The playground at Long Island Reserve will be expanded this year to incorporate an Expression Swing that allows children and their parents/carers to swing together, a new nature play trail and a new toilet pavilion.

Other aspirations for the future of the reserve include formalised trailer parking and riverside picnic nodes that include seating and shelter, along with linkage to the Murray Coorong Trail.

A new playground featuring an expression swing will also be installed at Woodlane Reserve this year and restroom facilities will be upgraded.

Future aspirations for this reserve include a formalised rubble carpark with kerbing and wheelstops (37 carparks and 27 boat parks), concrete path, new riverside picnic nodes incorporating shelter, seating and BBQs, and possibly a new jetty/dock and sandy beach.

A \$3million redevelopment of Sturt Reserve will begin with a new boat ramp at the southern end of our jewel in the crown before the end of this year.

The Sturt Reserve Masterplan future upgrades include: a pontoon, carparks and boat wash-down area to compliment the boat ramp; a three metre wide shared path along the riverfront, public toilets attached to the new rowing club building, a landing in front of the rowing club for launching boats and recreation, improved lawn tennis facilities and more indigenous public art.

Longer term planning for Sturt Reserve includes the provision of quality hospitality and services for visitors, a war memorial garden, outdoor entertainment stage, dog park, accommodation, river beach and wetland splash play area to complement our iconic Bunyip attraction.

Drought proofing our open spaces has been a long term project for Council to ensure our green lawns and shade trees are maintained in an environmentally responsible way.

Stormwater is now collected and stored for use at Sturt Reserve and other parks and gardens.

This approach ensures supply and is of economic benefit to the Rural City while at the same time helping to protect our other significant outdoor playground – the River Murray.
